- ➤ Dale Leavitt- Oyster Farmer in Fairhaven. Due to the severe storms from climate change and an antiquated sewer system, the Greater New Bedford sewer system has overflowed into Buzzards Bay, affecting the aquaculture industry. That, combined with a different classification model that the Environmental Protection Agency is using, had shut down oyster farming in the Buzzards Bay area for months. We are not conditioning open and hoping the criteria will be changed to allow shellfish harvesting in the Buzzards Bay area. dale@bluestreamaquaculture.com
- ➤ Liz Miller from Spoonfuls is a food recovery organization that recovers food from grocery retail, primarily on some farms and some wholesale distributors. We have a new strategic plan, which includes geographic expansion into Southeastern MA along the Route 24 corridor. We are looking for connections. LMiller@spoonfuls.org
- Pam Kuechler, PACE, New Bedford. The food pantry is open five days a week. We just got a grant to deliver food to older women in New Bedford, and if that goes well, we will expand that service.
